LATINOS IN CONGRESS AND STATE HOUSES AFTER ELECTION 2004: A STATE-BY-STATE SUMMARY

This publication is the final in a series of *Election Profiles* that the NALEO Educational Fund has published throughout the 2004 election season. This *Profile* provides a state-by-state analysis of federal and state races involving Latino candidates, and focuses on the composition of the Latino Congressional and state legislative delegations after the November 2004 elections.



Arizona

U.S. House of Representatives: Incumbents Ed Pastor (D) and Raul Grijalva (D) won re-election and will return to the U.S. House of Representatives.

STATE LEGISLATURE

State Senate: Four of Arizona's incumbent Latino State Senators were successful in their contests: Democrats Linda Aguirre, Jorge Luis Garcia, Richard Miranda, and Victor Soltero. They will be joined in the Senate by former State Representative Rebecca Rios, who won the seat held by her father, Pete Rios. State Senator Pete Rios was subject to term limits, and successfully ran for election to the Arizona State House of Representatives.

State Representatives: Democratic incumbents Steve Gallardo, Robert Meza, Ben Miranda, Amanda Aguirre, Linda Lopez, Tom Prezelski, Olivia Cajero Bedford, and Manuel Alvarez were victorious in their re-election bids. They will be joined by three new State Representatives. State Senator Pete Rios (D) won the seat in District 23, Cartwright School Board member Martha Garcia (D) was victorious in District 13 and Phoenix High School Board member David Lujan (D) will represent District 15.

Proposition 200:

Arizonans voted in favor of Proposition 200, 56% to 44%. Proposition 200 prohibits undocumented immigrants from obtaining “public benefits,” and requires public servants to report any immigrants they believe are violating “federal immigration law.” Additionally, Proposition 200 requires proof of citizenship when registering to vote.

A coalition of religious, civic and labor leaders, health care providers, and civil rights organizations are seeking a court order to bar the enforcement of Proposition 200.



California

U.S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

All seven of California’s incumbent Latino U.S. Representatives won re-election: Democrats Joe Baca, Xavier Becerra, Grace Flores Napolitano, Lucille Roybal-Allard, Loretta Sanchez, Linda Sanchez and Hilda Solis.

STATE LEGISLATURE

State Senators: California’s nine incumbent State Senators are midway through their terms. They will be joined by Abel Maldonado, the State Representative from San Luis Obispo who just won election as the state’s first Republican Latino State Senator.

State Assemblymembers: The twelve Latino incumbents who ran for re-election all won their races. These Assemblymembers include Democrats Simon Salinas, Nicole Parra, Cindy Montañez, Dario Frommer, Fabian Nuñez, Jenny Oropeza, Rudy Bermudez, Ed Chavez, Ron Calderon, Gloria Negrete-McLeod, and Juan Vargas; and Republican Bonnie Garcia. These incumbents will be joined in the Assembly by seven new members of California’s Latino delegation. Two of these members won election to seats held by termed-out State Representatives. Fresno County Supervisor Juan Arambula will serve in the district represented by State Assemblymember Sarah Reyes, and South Gate Councilmember Hector de La Torre will serve

in the district represented by State Assemblymember Marco Firebaugh. Other new Latino faces in the State Assembly include Rialto teacher Joe Baca, Jr., who will represent District 62; Newark City’s Alberto Torrico who will represent District 20; Coastal Commissioner Pedro Nava who will represent District 35; San Jose educator Joe Coto who will serve in the District 23; and community college professor Lori Saldaña who will represent District 76.

State Senators: Colorado's two incumbent Latino State Senators, Democrats Paula Sandoval and Abel Tapia, are midway through their terms and will be up for re-election in 2006.

State Representatives: All four Latino incumbent state representatives, Democrats Fran Coleman, Dorothy Butcher, Michael Garcia and Valentin Virgil, easily won their re-election bids. They will be joined in the Colorado state house by Antonito's Mayor, Rafael Lorenzo Gallegos (D).

U.S. House of Representatives: Incumbent Republican U.S. Reps. Lincoln Diaz-Balart, Mario Diaz-Balart, and Ileana Ros-Lehtinen were successful in their re-election bids and will return to the U.S. House of Representatives

State Senators: Florida's three incumbent Latino State Senators, Alex Diaz de la Portilla, Rodolfo Garcia, Jr., J. Alex Villalobos are midway through their terms and will be up for re-election in 2006

State Representatives: Eleven Latino incumbent State Representatives were successful in their re-election races: Republicans Rafael Arza, Gustavo Barreiro, Rene Garcia, Marcelo Llorente, Marco Rubio, Juan Carlos ("J.C.") Planas, John Quinones, David Rivera, Julio Robaina, and Juan Zapata; and Democrat Bob Henriquez.

Albuquerque's Department of Family and Community Services, Gerald Ortiz y Pino (D) won election to the seat held by Richard Romero, who attempted to unseat U.S. Rep. Heather Romero (R).
